The Chosen: Season 1 - Starting the week of September 8.

The Chosen, a dramatic video miniseries based on the Gospels; Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. At times drawing directly from the Gospels themselves while at others imagining "what might have happened" or "what could have been going on" in the lives of those who became Jesus' first disciples, the series seeks to unify the way the individual Gospels tell their particular "takes" on the story. Drawing from both direct biblical context, historical background, and the creative imagination of the creators, *The Chosen* is a great way "to see" the Word—both what the Gospels themselves "say," as well as sparking viewers' imaginations to "see" Jesus, the Word made flesh. Each episode runs anywhere from 30 minutes to an hour. PLUS, each week we'll have some time for discussion and study of the Bible itself, so this could be a little longer than "the usual" hour study.

October is National Disability Employment Awareness Month. Led by Linda J. Peterson, M.A.T., former contract staff for

the Committee on Disability of the NCCC, USA, she writes: "It is well with my soul… I love this hymn. It speaks to a steadfast and all-encompassing love that God has for each of us. It also speaks to the deep faith and trust in God that the author of the hymn has, despite the deep pain and sorrow he experienced. As a young person growing up with a visible physical disability the world told me that I was not acceptable as I was. I was other. How could God love me? Am I worthy of God's love? In my journey of faith, I have grappled with images in the Bible of persons with disabilities. I am excited to share with you in a four-week Bible study what I have experienced in my faith journey and how the church has helped me to joyfully proclaim, "It is well with my soul!""

A Small Group Study Exploring the Muslim Faith

My Neighbor is a Muslim

Originating from a request of ELCA pastors and congregations in the St. Cloud community who requested a resource that would provide accurate information about foundations of the Muslim faith, Lutheran Social Services of MN put together these materials in 2015 with the intention simply to open doors, minds, and hearts and help to dispel stereotypes and myths about Muslim neighbors just enough to start more conversations. "My Neighbor is Muslim" is a 6-week study and discussion guide designed to provide an introduction to Islam, promote cultural understanding and encourage interfaith dialogue. To create this resource, LSS-MN worked in partnership with Dr. Todd Green at

Luther College, Imam Hassan Ali Mohamud with the Minnesota Da'wah Institute and Islamic Dawah Center in St. Paul and faculty of Luther Seminary in St. Paul. This resource was created primarily to help those who are not Muslim to develop a basic understanding of the Muslim faith, learn how we can be culturally sensitive and get to know our new neighbors in Minnesota who are Muslim. Minnesota is seeing some changing demographics due to an increase in recent arrivals of Muslim immigrants and refugees, and resources like these can help us build positive relations with people who come from different faith traditions and increase our understanding of cultural differences.

September 15: Family Promise

One of Zion's expressed values is that of SERVICE: we strive to be a WELCOMING faith community. Growing. Caring. SERVING. One of the ways we live that out is through our connection to Family Promise in Anoka County (FPAC). Beginning in 2009 with a group of Anoka County residents, congregation leaders, laypeople, and other caring people who saw a need in our community, FPAC presents a model in which community needs invite a community response. The name refers to the promise, in the sense of commitment, made by our community to families in need. Join us to learn about how FPAC is doing that; how Zion responds; and how YOU might be a part of Christ's call to our congregation and its commitment to serve. Join Adam Monaghan, FPAC's Director of Engagement and & Operations and Zion member Pat Stearns to learn more about Family Promise and how our congregation can continue to support the Anoka community.

Family Promise in Anoka County moved into the new Family Service Center at 363 Coon Rapids Blvd at the end of 2023. This location is more accessibly located for the families served, volunteers, and community partners. Family Promise is moving forward with plans to build a Guest House that will provide eight units of housing for families in the Shelter Program. Plans have been submitted to the city of Coon Rapids with the hope that the site plan will be approved by early fall and ground breaking will take place Spring of 2025. While grant funding over the last two years totaling \$4.6 million has made this project possible, at least \$400,000 will need to be raised over the next year as part of targeted campaign to complete this project without debt. A survivor childhood cancer, he is a double, above-the-knee amputee, who generally wears a bicycle and a smile. 

Monday, September 23, 2024 - The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell: A Novel by Robert Dugoni



Sam Hill always saw the world through different eyes. Born with red pupils, he was called "Devil Boy" or Sam "Hell" by his classmates; "God's will" is what his mother called his ocular albinism. Her words were of little comfort, but Sam persevered, buoyed by his mother's devout faith, his father's practical wisdom, and his two other misfit friends.



Monday, October 28, 2024 - The Frozen River: A Novel by Ariel Lawhon


Maine, 1789: When the Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice, Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As a midwife and healer, she is privy to much of what goes on behind closed doors in Hallowell. Her diary is a record of every birth and death, crime and debacle that unfolds in the close-knit community. Months earlier, Martha documented the details of an alleged rape committed by two of the town's most respected gentlemen—one of whom has now been found dead in the ice. But when a local physician undermines her conclusion, declaring the death to be an accident, Martha is forced to investigate the shocking murder on her own.



Over the course of one winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha doggedly pursues the truth. Her diary soon lands at the center of the scandal, implicating those she loves, and compelling Martha to decide where her own loyalties lie.

Monday, November 25, 2024 - A Walk in the Park: The True Story of a Spectacular Misadventure in the Grand Canyon by Kevin Fedarko



A few years after quitting his job to follow an ill-advised dream of becoming a guide on the Colorado River, Kevin Fedarko was approached by his best friend, the National Geographic photographer Pete McBride, with a vision as bold as it was harebrained. Together, they would embark on an end-to-end traverse of the Grand Canyon, a journey that, McBride promised, would be "a walk in the park." Against his better judgment, Fedarko agreed to the scheme, unaware that the small cluster of experts who had completed the crossing billed it as "the toughest hike in the world."


The ensuing ordeal, which lasted more than a year, revealed a place that was deeper, richer, and far more complex than anything the two men had imagined—and came within a hair's breadth of killing them both. They struggled to make their way through the all but impenetrable reaches of its truest wilderness, a vertical labyrinth of thousand-foot cliffs and crumbling ledges where water is measured out by the teaspoon and every step is fraught with peril—and where, even today, there is still no trail along the length of the country's best-known and most iconic park.

Along the way, veteran long-distance hikers ushered them into secret pockets, invisible to the millions of tourists gathered on the rim, where only a handful of humans have ever laid eyes. Members of the canyon's eleven Native American tribes brought them face-to-face with layers of history that forced them to reconsider myths at the center of our national parks—and exposed them to the impinging threats of commercial tourism. Even Fedarko's dying father, who had first pointed him toward the canyon more than forty years earlier but had never set foot there himself, opened him to a new way of seeing the landscape. And always, there was the great gorge itself: austere and unforgiving but suffused with magic, drenched in wonder, and redeemed by its own transcendent beauty.

Monday, January 27, 2025 - West with Giraffes: A Novel West with Giraffes: A Novel by Lynda Rutledge

An emotional, rousing novel inspired by the incredible true story of two giraffes who made headlines and won the hearts of Depression-era America. "Few true friends have I known and two were giraffes..." Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave.

It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and worldweary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first




female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.

Orphan Train meets Before We Were Yours meets Water for Elephants in this compelling multigenerational novel of survival, love, and the families we make.

In 1924, four-year-old Cecily Larson's mother reluctantly drops her off at an orphanage in Chicago, promising to be back once she's made enough money to support both Cecily and herself. But she never returns, and shortly after high-spirited Cecily turns seven, she is sold to a traveling circus to perform as the "little sister" to glam-


orous bareback rider Isabelle DuMonde. With Isabelle and the rest of the circus, Cecily finally feels she's found the family she craves. But as the years go by, the cracks in her little world begin to show. In 2015, Cecily is now 94 and living a quiet life in Minnesota, with her daughter, granddaughter, and great-grandson. But when her family decides to surprise her with an at-home DNA test, the unexpected results not only bring to light the tragic love story that Cecily has kept hidden for decades but also throw into question everything about the family she's raised and claimed as her own for nearly seventy years. Cecily and everyone in her life must now decide who they really are and what family—and forgiveness—really mean.

Monday, March 24, 2025 - Has Anyone Seen My Toes? by Christopher Buckley

During the pandemic, an aging screenwriter is holed up in a coastal South Carolina town with his beloved second wife, Peaches. He's been binge-eating for a year and developed a notable rapport with the local fast-food chain Hippo King. He struggles to work—on a ludicrous screenplay about a Nazi attempt to kidnap FDR and, naturally, an article for Etymology Today on English words of Carthaginian origin. He's told Peaches so often about the origins of the world mayonnaise that she's developed an aversion to using the condiment. He thinks he has Covid. His wife thinks he is losing his mind. In short, your typical pandemic worries. Things were going from bad to worse even before his doctor suggested a battery of brain tests. He knows what that means: dementia!


But even in these scary times, there are plenty of things to distract him. His iPhone is fat-shaming him. He's been trying to read Proust and thinks the French novelist

Monday, April 28, 2025 - Beneath a Scarlet Sky: A Novel by Mark Sullivan

He's a normal Italian teenager—obsessed with music, food, and girls—but his days of innocence are numbered. When his family home in Milan is destroyed by Allied bombs, Pino joins an underground railroad helping Jews escape over the Alps, and falls for Anna, a beautiful widow six years his senior.

In an attempt to protect him, Pino's parents force him to enlist as a German soldier—a move they think will keep him out of combat. But after Pino is injured, he is recruited at the tender age of eighteen to become the personal driver for Adolf Hitler's left hand in Italy, General Hans Leyers, one of the Third Reich's most mysterious and powerful commanders.

Now, with the opportunity to spy for the Allies inside the German High

Command, Pino endures the horrors of the war and the Nazi occupation by fighting in secret, his courage bolstered by his love for Anna and for the life he dreams they will one day share.
