From the Creation Care Team

In the fall, gardeners typically prepare their outdoor landscapes for rest, readying it for another glorious growing season the following year. Here are some Creation-friendly tips that support insects/pollinators, wildlife, trees and turf lawns during the winter months. Many gardeners tidy up their perennial garden beds by cutting them back. This year, keep stems standing for insects that lay their eggs inside. It's important to leave them standing in the spring until temperatures are consistently warmer to allow the hatched insects to emerge.

With food scarce in the winter, native wildlife and seed-eating birds such as finches, chickadees and juncos benefit when you keep any native seed-bearing heads upright (coneflowers, sedum, etc.). Leaving dried stalks and leaves as-is also provides some interesting winter visual interest. Ornamental grasses, especially, add color, movement and texture. Of course, remove and discard any diseased parts of the plants. Learn more about prepping your perennials for winter at:

If you have a traditional turf lawn with trees, mulch fallen leaves with your mower (as long as they're not too thick). The chipped-up leaves return nitrogen to the soil, helping to fertilize your lawn, and you get to cut back on harmful synthetic fertilizers. They also will benefit your other garden beds, and are especially advantageous to trees, as the decomposing organic matter protects tree roots in winter. Plus, as noted in the Leaf Limb website listed below, "Leaves are free, readily available, and provide an excellent source of rotting stuff that feeds the living biology within the soil." How great is that! We strive continually to educate ourselves and the congregation as well as connect with sources of support in the wider community. We want Zion to become one of the safe places for those affected by domestic violence—to learn how to best support someone in need and where to refer them for specialist services.

A poster in the restrooms provides education with tear off resource numbers for those concerned with a loved one's drinking or drug use. Our ZAAM brochure is complete and ready to print. Look for it in several locations throughout Zion.

SAVING A LIFE. A guest speaker through the Steve Rummier HOPE organization will present an opioid drug use educational program at 6:30 p.m. October 22 in the Fellowship Hall. How these drugs act within the body as well as the noted behavior and symptoms of use will be discussed. Naloxone, (narcan) an antidote to prevent overdose death, will be demonstrated. All participants who are registered by October 10 will receive a free Naloxone kit. Please sign up at the Welcome Desk.
