a message from your pastors



One of these days in preparation for the church season of Epiphany, I'm going to figure out a way to rig up a hat with a light bulb on it, something that I can get to light up during the Sunday "Word For Kids" time. If you've ever seen any kind of cartoon on television, you'll recognize that whenever a character has an idea, a thought, a plot or plan, a lit lightbulb, of course, appears over that character's head. In no small way, the whole point of the season of

Epiphany could be centered on that image, for throughout the season, beginning with the Magi's visitation to the Holy Family on January 6 (the DAY of Epiphany), all of our Scripture readings include "an epiphany," a realization, a dawning—a light bulb coming on—about who this child born in Bethlehem really is. We know from the Christmas story that, contrary to that contemporary Christmas song, MARY KNOWS who this child is whom she bears, the angels reveal to THE SHEPHERDS who this child is. And then beginning with the Magi, the WHOLE WORLD soon begins to learn and to have the lightbulb of Epiphany come on! But the revelation of Epiphany isn't just a literary device for the story (or stories) of the season; the stories are for the sake of our lightbulbs, as well. The gifts of the Magi—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—bear witness not only to their faith in and response to Jesus, but more importantly, invite us deeply into our faith and response as the King worthy to receive our offerings, the One worthy of worship, the One whose death and resurrection offer us eternal hope as we face the brokenness and death of this world. The voice and the dove that accompany Jesus' baptism by John in the River Jordan (the text for Sunday, January 12, the 1st Sunday after Epiphany) not only flips the switch of revelation to "on" for those in the story who might have been watching and listening, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22); these words may as well have been said at our own baptisms, as well. Do you not know that, even at times in spite of yourself and what you do or leave undone, YOU are a beloved and well-pleasing child of God? (Here's where the lightbulb over our own heads should come on!) The abundance of wine at the wedding feast in Cana (Jesus' first public miracle, recorded in John 2 for 2nd Sunday after Epiphany on January 19) isn't only for the sake of those attending that party, as much as it is to light us with the promise and hope of lesus as our abundant joy, even under less-than-ideal circumstances.

May the warmth and joy of Christmas continue to enlighten you with faith, hope, and love! See you in worship!

Why are You Surprised?

When my son was two and he threw himself to the floor crying because I poked the straw into his juice box, his sister shot me the look. Evidently, I was supposed to remember my toddler wanted to do it by himself. When our dog stops to sniff at something during our walks, we say to him in jest, "Why do you have to be such a dog?" Or, why was I surprised when I found evidence of a black bear at our cabin, just days after I hung a bird feeder? Our neighbors had encountered a bear earlier that summer. Surprised? Really? From the Zion Addiction and Awareness Ministry (ZAAM)

In January, ZAAM will be working to bring more awareness and education about addiction and recovery. We are hoping to host a speaker from Frogtown Cafe, an organization run by volunteers who host "Recovery Circles". Hopefully, increased awareness on our part will lead us to noticing the need and the programs that already exist locally. We also continue to add books and pamphlets to our library which are free to take out. In addition, we are learning about grants and services available through Anoka County that we could apply for—all of which relate to addiction, mental health and healthy relationships. A big concern everywhere is the impact that drug and alcohol use have on youth. For example, according to the Minnesota Department of Health, "Early alcohol use, especially binge drinking, is associated with poorer social and educational outcomes during high school, as well as problems later in life." How can we as a congregation be a buffer to such dire outcomes? How can we cultivate the values in our youth that helps them make good choices? A wish for the future...."I pray that I may start each new day with a clean blackboard and write upon it only what is good for me." from *One Day at a Time in Al-Anon*

From Zion's Creation Care Team - A Reflection on Plastic Recycling

Just think—Zion collected a thousand pounds of plastic bags, wrappers, and more, which may not seem like a big deal until one stops to think that each item collected (most of them, anyway) weigh fractions of a gram! This was a HUGE accomplishment, and special thanks need to be extended to **Bill Travis** and **Ellen Johnson** for being our Creation Care Heroes for collecting, weighing, and transporting our weekly collections.

It seems to me that the accomplishment isn't just the collection of a thousand pounds of plastic but more so in the living out of God's intended purpose for us as human beings in relationship to the creation God has given us to take care of! The very first words God speaks to the humans created in the image of God delineate this God-given purpose of care: "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." (Gen. 1:28). This language of "multiply," "subdue," and "have dominion over" may seem like a carte blanche license to do as we please with this creation.

But when one reads even more of the Bible, allowing the Bible to interpret itself over and against our misinterpretations, we get a much fuller and certainly a more care-oriented vision from God for our place in creation. For example, **Psalm 72**, a royal psalm likely used for some celebration or commemoration of Israel's king (a coronation, or a birthday, perhaps) includes some of the exact same words, language, and fuller vision from God. In describing what the king's reign should be like over his people—again, using the same words, language, and vision given to the newly created humans in Genesis 1—far from the expectation that king would do whatever he darn well pleases, we encounter language like this instead: "May the king be like rain that falls on mown grass, like showers that water the earth...For he delivers the needy when they call, the poor and those who have no helper... He has pity on the weak and needy, and saves the lives of the needy...From oppression and violence the king redeems their life; and precious is their blood in his sight." (72:6, 12-14). Here is a vision for care, gentleness, and responsibility, especially for those who are most vulnerable, which very well could be our planet.

What if, from the get-go, THAT is what God has in mind for those created in the image of God? If that's the case, it would seem, then, that care of creation, especially in its current vulnerabilities, isn't just kind of a minor thing that maybe, perhaps, if we get around to it, or if it interests us enough, we actually do. Perhaps being created in the image of God, the gracious King of the Universe, means that care of creation isn't just an occasional "and other duties as necessary" part of our job description. Perhaps it IS our job description, whether that care of creation includes caring for other humans or caring for the natural world.

This past spring, I read about "the Great Pacific Garbage Patch" that stretches roughly the distance between Hawaii and California and is about the size of the state of Alaska! It's made up largely of plastic but includes other debris and waste from Asia, North and South America. Fortunately, organizations like <u>The Ocean Cleanup</u> are developing technologies and techniques for cleaning up the Great Pacific Garbage Patch and other similar islands of human waste. (You can click on the link to learn more about The Ocean Cleanup.) When we read about such huge, global problems, I suspect our response can go one of two directions: either we can be paralyzed by the enormity of such a problem; or, we can be motivated even just to do our small part. Admittedly, 1,000 pounds of plastic compared to the Great Pacific Garbage Patch is just a drop in the ocean--see what I did there?! But every little bit helps as we seek to be like rain that falls on mown grass, like gentle showers that water the earth.

True enough, we are no longer collecting these plastics here at the Church. The Creation Care Team's prayer is that you have begun to develop habits in collecting this waste yourself and dropping it off at other locales connected with NexTrex (the collector of the plastic and manufacturer of the park bench we'll be receiving). Those locations include all area Coborn's, Cub, and Kohl's stores! Thanks for doing your part!
