Unbroken: A Living Faith

Ash Wednesday is March 5. Worship times will be at noon & 6:30 p.m. and we will have the imposition of ashes and Holy Communion as part of both services. Our mid-week Lenten theme this year is:





When so many people identify themselves as Christian how can we spend some time thinking deeply about what we really believe? What is the what? What are the foundational beliefs and how are they living and moving with us as we change and grow? Faith is passed down from generation to generation - it's an unbroken line of ancestry that connects us all the way back to Jesus. The powers of the world wanted to break Jesus and yet this faith that we rest on is strong enough that they couldn't do it. We are a part of this great tradition that will not and cannot be broken.

Our noon Lenten service will be a prayer service, with hymns, prayer and a sermon. Our service at 6:30 p.m. will be a traditional evening prayer service with special music, evening liturgy, and a sermon following our Lenten theme.

Each weekend and mid-week service will center on one of "The 7 Principles of A Living Catechism." The concept of Living Catechism flows from the fundamental idea that, as God's beloved people, we are always discerning, always reforming, and always leaning into what it means to be the people of God in each unique time and place. It asks how we articulate the core understanding of a Lutheran perspective and take seriously the complex realities of life today.

Please join us this Lenten Season for worship on Sundays and Wednesdays.

Prayer, Reflection, and Conversation in Lent

Part of the traditional Ash Wednesday service includes this explanation, not just for Ash Wednesday, but for Lent as a whole:



"Friends in Christ, today with the whole church we enter the time of remembering Jesus' passover from death to life, and our life in Christ is renewed.

We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for God's mercy. We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent—self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love—strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection."

In other words, Lent is a time for practice. For exercise. For finding new "spirituality muscles." Or perhaps rediscovering those we haven't used in a while.

Sometimes in Lent, people give up or abstain from something they might see as a temptation—caffeine (as if!) or chocolate or second helpings. And perhaps that abstinence and denial actually has some way of drawing our hearts and minds to God—think of Israel's 40 years in the Wilderness, relying utterly on God for all that they needed for daily life; or Jesus' 40 days in the Wilderness during His temptation. (By the way—want to guess how many days there are in Lent?!)

But sometimes in Lent, people will ADD to their faith practice, perhaps something they'd like to grow stronger in such as prayer or daily devotional readings.

As your pastors, we would like to invite you to be a part of a brief gathering **after each of our Wednesday Lenten services—both the NOON service and the EVENING service—for Prayer, Reflection, and Conversation**. When we gather, we'll be using a format called "the Faith5," first pioneered by the Faith Inkubators organization. This format invites followers of Jesus into an easy-to-remember, practical, and portable way of practicing our faith:

- 1. We SHARE what's going on in our lives, most often calling that what's-going-on "Highs & Lows."
- 2. We READ a piece of scripture.
- 3. We TALK about what we've read.
- 4. We PRAY—think of our Christ Care Prayers with which we start every small group gathering here at Zion.
- 5. We BLESS one another—think about the Baptismal blessings we often bestow on our children during the Word for Kids on Sunday morning.

And, we'll actually be adding a SIXTH practice:

6. We imagine ways we might SERVE God by serving other human beings.

Just about anyone can do these steps at any time, in any place. So please be encouraged to give it a try! Our time during Lent is a perfect, low-impact, safe way and place to practice this format so that you can "take it home" with you!

Look Up

During the winter, a fun activity as a child was to look out the car window to spot bird nests in the bare deciduous trees. Now I find myself encouraging my grandchildren to look up as I point out nests and recently, I noted thirteen while driving from my house to the grocery store. A bald eagle's nest can hardly be missed since they range from 5-6 feet wide and 3 feet high, and I am fortunate that one of these massive abodes is built on a towering utility pole, along a road I frequent. It thrills me when there's activity at the nest.

While it's novel to play the nest game in the car or at the park, the act of looking up could also be considered a

gesture to seek the Lord our God. "To you I lift up my eyes, O you who are enthroned in the heavens! Behold, as the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of the maidservant to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the Lord our God, till he has mercy upon us." Psalm 123:1-2. One afternoon last summer while walking my dog, I was ruminating over a difficult situation in my life. Similar to other times in the past, my thoughts played like a tape with a continuous loop. As I was nearing the end of my walk, I looked up to see a fish symbol representing Jesus on my neighbor's garage wall. After I allowed the surprise to settle in, I realized it also shredded the tape looping in my brain and served as a reminder that God encourages us to surrender our worries through prayer. I don't know for certain but I believe it was a reflection from the sun bouncing off a metal plant hanger on their porch. What a marvelous reminder that God is good, all the time!



Stewardship Update - Building and Technology Improvement Fund

Part of Zion's 2025 Stewardship Campaign includes the Building and Technology Improvement Fund to help repair and upgrade Zion's facilities and technologies. One of those areas is to replace key pieces of audio and video equipment in the Sanctuary. Thanks to all of your financial support, over \$85,000 was put into the Building and Technology Fund to go towards the projects. Two new soundboards, new wiring for the video system, two new projectors, and an unforeseen purchase of new amplifiers for the sound system have been purchased and installed in the Sanctuary. Minnesota Council of Churches - Ramadan Open Houses

This past year, our adult education has spent time and energy learning about Islam. **The first part of this emphasis** came from a study prepared by LSS of MN called *My Neighbor is Muslim*. **The second part of this emphasis**, "Islam 101", came from a guest presenter at our Sunday morning Adult Faith Forums, Dr. Tamim Saidi. Both of these, the study guide and Dr. Saidi's presentations, can be found on Zion's website or YouTube channel.

I would encourage you to ask the question: **Why? Why are we spending so much time learning about Islam?** And the answer might go something like this:

- To quote from Dr. Rolf Jacobson (Professor of Old Testament and the Alvin N. Rogness Chair in Scripture, Theology, and Ministry at Luther Seminary): "God has given us new neighbors to love and to bless. In fact, God is always giving us new neighbors to love and bless...Whenever God gives us new neighbors to love and bless, God calls on us to get to know and understand them." (My Neighbor is Muslim, "Response to 'What is the Islamic Understanding of Charity," p. 31).
- In many ways, this study has invited us to consider our own faith and practices as followers of Jesus: How can
 WE grow stronger in our witness to God's grace, mercy and love revealed through Jesus?
- Looking at the way Jesus responded to those labeled as "outsiders"—i.e., those whom the Pharisees called "sinners" (see Luke 5:27-31); note Jesus' pursuit of the Samaritan woman at the well in Sychar (see John 4); or Jesus' continual "transgression" of geographical boundaries between "us" and "them" (see Luke 8:26-39)—we do well both as individuals and as a faith community to lead lives that echo Jesus.
- All of this very well—at the very least—might lead us to respond to our Muslim neighbors with curiosity, patience, and kindness, all characteristics we might recognize embodied in Christ.

These things may be all the truer and more needed in our present cultural climate that seems to have normalized casting fear and mistrust on "the other."

Our third part of this program year's emphasis on Islam: Taking Heart—Iftar Meals During Ramadan

Someone once said to me, "It's hard to hate someone when you're sharing food." So the third part of our emphasis on Islam comes through an invitation from area mosques and Islamic centers through the Minnesota Council of Churches and the Muslim American Society of Minnesota (MAS-MN) to attend iftar meals during Ramadan, which began Friday, February 28. (This was a response that Dr. Saidi encouraged during his presentations.)

Coordinated by the Minnesota Council of Churches and MAS-MN to bring Christians and members of other faith communities together with Muslims for food and conversation during Ramadan, the Taking Heart Open Houses program has been bringing Muslims and non-Muslims together for food and conversation for 18 years. In 2024 over 1,000 community members participated in Taking Heart during Ramadan, the month of the Islamic lunar calendar during which Muslims abstain from food and drink from sunrise to sunset. (In 2025, Ramadan falls between February 28-March 29.) Fasting during Ramadan is one of the "five pillars" of Islam and is performed to learn piety, self-restraint, compassion, and generosity. "Iftar" is one of the observances of Ramadan and is often done as a community, with Muslim people and others gathering to break their fast together after sunset.

There are quite a few mosques and Islamic centers around the Metro opening themselves up to host guests for the iftar meals during the upcoming month of Ramadan, including a number very close to us in Maple Grove, Brooklyn Park, Blaine, Coon Rapids, and Fridley. I am planning on attending the one at the Brooklyn Park Islamic Center, 2100 93rd Way N on Tuesday, March 11 at 6 p.m. and I would love to have folks attend with me. Social Justice Gathering - March 6

And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to walk humbly with your God. Micah 6:8

There will be a Social Justice gathering on March 6 at 6 p.m. in the Legacy Room. The purpose of the gathering is to develop action steps by reviewing the gaps people in our community are experiencing or will be experiencing as new restrictions appear. We will explore how we can help bridge these gaps for our neighbors. All are welcome for this discussion and planning session.

From Zion's Creation Care Team - Adopt a What?

Did you know: Minnesota has 11,842 lakes (10+ acres); 69,200 miles of natural rivers and streams; and 10.6 million acres of wetlands (source: MN DNR), plus innumerable neighborhood streams and ponds. Our waters flow north to Hudson Bay, east to the Atlantic Ocean and south to the Gulf. All these, to some degree, provide food, water, shelter, recreation, and flood control for ALL of God's creatures. Sadly, our lifestyles are one cause for their decline: whatever is on our streets (organic material, garbage, roadway contaminants) ends up in a waterway. Garbage harms aquatic life, while organic materials that enter any body of water consume oxygen as it decomposes, harming aquatics due to decreased oxygen levels. Decomposition also releases nutrients that lead to algal blooms, which are toxic to humans, animals, and the environment.

What can we do to reduce this water pollution? Adopt a storm drain! This is a nationwide program where ordinary folks like you and me can 'adopt' a neighborhood storm drain (or 2 or 3 or more!). By cleaning it regularly, you can prevent garbage and organic material from entering local bodies of water. You can lighten your work by educating your neighbors, too. For example, many communities don't allow grass clippings to be directed onto the street due to their harmful effects on local waters (they're a great and free source of nutrients for your yard, too!). This is a great family or do-on-your-own activity! To learn more and sign up https://mn.adopt-a-drain.org/.

From the Zion Addiction and Awareness Ministry (ZAAM)

Our program ministry has been diligent in creating, scheduling, planning, and learning through educational programs, interviews and tours in order that we may present educational experiences relating to how addiction and faith affect our lives. Prevention of addiction begins with education. We also want you to know any personal concerns you may have can be brought to Zion's prayer team for prayers and further communication if requested.
